Camp owner Bob Jones, a former educator, lives on the camp's well-maintained, manicured grounds. He took over the private camp 56 years ago to continue bringing options to families who prefer to have their young ones play in a positive, safe, controlled environment with caring adults monitoring their activities. A full-time health/ first aid person is also on staff.

He attributes Winnewald's success to consistent ownership, a loyal leadership team and the variety of outdoor educational and recreational activities offered. For more than 70 years, Winnewald has been the place to let children freely explore nature and new interests each summer.

Jones is especially proud of the Conversation Time program in which the counselors pick a topic for the kids to discuss following the CAMP principles of Consideration, Attitude, Manners and Participation, which artfully teaches campers to get along with others.

"We often say that Winnewald is a hidden gem in Hunterdon County," he said.

Mostly staffed by certified teachers and college students, many of whom are former campers, Winnewald offers new opportunities for qualified counselors each year including for retirees. Jones is currently interviewing individuals for a June start and encourages candidates to apply.

"People who are interested in children and

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the out-of-doors," he said describing what makes a great camp counselor. "That's what we're looking for."

For college students, he likens the experience to an internship noting that elements of a great resume comprise leadership, goal setting, teamwork and planning — all of which can be acquired through the role of counselor.

Even students entering the ninth grade can prepare for a junior counselor position during their high school years by participating in the camp's leadership training program which grants them eligibility to serve.
